## FUNERAL OF ANDY BECKER MONDAY LARGELY ATTENDED

Victim of Murderous Bullet Laid  
Away at St. Mary's Cemetery—  
Funeral Ceremonies of Catholic  
Church.

All that was mortal of Andy Becker, of Bay St. Louis, who was the victim of a gun-toter Sunday afternoon while returning from Kiln, was laid away "at rest" in the hallowed precincts of St. Mary's Catholic cemetery, in the Becker family burial plot, where many beautiful flowers, lavish in number and beauteous profusion, marked the last resting place.

The funeral took place Monday afternoon at 5:30 o'clock, from the late residence in St. John street. Here many friends and acquaintances gathered to pay their respects to the memory and tribute of the deceased. It was said to be one of the longest funeral corteges ever seen in Bay St. Louis.

Rev. Father Leo Fahey, from the church of Our Lady of the Gulf, conducted the ceremony at the house and at the church, also at the grave where the last sacred rites were performed and a sorrowing assemblage felt keenly the loss of a worthy citizen, cut down in the very prime of his usefulness, snatched away from his loved ones.

Surviving are the widow and three children, Andy, Jr., 10 years; Marion, aged 7, and Joyce, aged 5 years. Also parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ed. Becker, aged and residents of Bay St. Louis for many years, esteemed and highly respected citizens. In addition to his parents and immediate family two sisters survive, Mrs. Flora Taconi and Mrs. August Sentinelli.

Andy Becker was a native of Bay St. Louis and would have been 35 years of age this summer. He was connected with the local Chevrolet automobile agency and in addition operated a taxi service. He was well and widely known by the traveling public for his personal courtesy and efficiency. Reliable, prompt and of a likable personality he had friends wherever he was known.

Among the many floral offerings was one of white lillies, bearing a card, "With sympathy, from the taxi drivers of Bay St. Louis," this and other designs marked the last resting place.
