**Wedded in Life and
Wedded in Death.**

Samuel S. Giveans, a well-known resident of this city, for over twenty-five years, died at the family home in Main street Monday morning at 9:45 o'clock, after an illness of asthma extending over a period of a long while.

The deceased was a native of New Jersey, where he was born 68 years ago, and was the oldest of his family of brothers and sisters. He is survived, in addition to his own immediate family, by one brother, Isadore Giveans, of Newton, N. J., and two sisters, Mrs. J. Fisher, of Washington, D. C., and Mrs. Hanna Conch, residing in the North, and a second cousin, J. N. Wisner, of Bay St. Louis.

Mr. Giveans was well-known and esteemed by all who knew him. He was a skilled workman in woodwork; an artisan truly. A man who was ever devoted to his family, and, it might be said, a man who lived his life under the home roof.

Unknown that her husband had died and was buried only the day before, Mrs. Giveans, born Emaline Nicaise, of Bay St. Louis, passed away into the great beyond Wednesday night at 9:45 o'clock, death resulting from yellow jaundice and a complication of other diseases. Mrs. Giveans was aged 58 years, a daughter of Mrs. (Widow) Edmond Nicaise, rich in golden years; also a sister of Mrs. Joseph E. Saucier, wife of Post Master Saucier. The funeral took place Thursday and was largely attended.

The remains of both husband and wife, wedded so long and happily in life — now bride and bridesgroom in death — were tenderly laid away "at rest" in St. Mary's Cemetery, Rev. Father Downing officiating.

Seven children survive their parents. These are: Isadore, Roger, Chris, Abbie, Adele, Elliott, John, who have the sympathy of the community in their double bereavement.
