## DEATH OF LEADING AND WELL-KNOWN CITIZEN OF HANCOCK --

E. H. Hoffmann, Well-Known Former Clerk of Courts of Hancock County, and Leading Citizen

PASSED AWAY MONDAY NIGHT AT 9:50 O'CLOCK.

Born in New Orleans and Was 70 Years of Age Last October — Funeral Largely Attended.

Emile Hugo Hoffmann died at the family home in Main Street Mon day night at 9:50 o'clock, surround ed by his loved ones and friends and neighbors who were in constant attendance either in the home or at the sick bedside.

The end came peacefully, and, while it had been expected momentarily lor the past month or more, the news nevertheless was received as a shock and earned with it much regret at the loss and sorrow for the bereaved relatives.

Mr. Hoffmann had been ill from time to time tor over a long period. About a year since his malady took a serious turn and his condition grew worse with time. Every attention possible was given the patient and it is due to the tender and constant nursing that he rallied time and again and lived longer than under ordinary circumstances.

Emile Hugo Hoffman was a native of New Orleans. On the 2nd of October he was 70 years of age, born in 1849. He was the first of the children of the late Conrad Hoffmann and Agnes Weisberger, both natives of Baden, Germany, but who resided here for many years and were among the prominent and leading citizens of the place during their time. He was reared in this city and educated by the Brothers of the Sacred Heart at College. Prior to 1879 he was dep uty clerk of the courts of Hancock county, under Clerk Murphy, and serving so well, that in 1879, when

a vacancy occurred, he was elected clerk. This responsible and trust worthy position he held consecutively for over thirty odd years, retiring seven years ago.

The Sea Coast Echo, in its issue of September 5, 1903, made this refer ence to Mr. Hoffmann's official abili ty: "The office of chancery and cir cuit clerk is one requiring capable business methods, methodical accur acy and good common sense to fill satisfactorily. While its duties are clearly defined, they can be admin istered to the greater satisfaction of the public by the admixture of a lit tle courtesy and a spirit of kindliness on the part of the official in charge. It is this policy that has added to the popularity of E. H. Hoffmann, the present incumbent. Mr. Hoffmann's discharge of duties of responsibility and trust and his ability as a good business manager, careful account and and master of detail have aided him in the conduct of these offices quite as much as a thorough knowledge of local people and conditions."

In 1881 he married Miss Catherine Ruisech and the union has been blessed with a splendid family, who have enjoyed the influence of a Christian education. His children are Misses Catherine and Alvina and Mr George W. Hoffmann. Two grown sons, deceased, were Emile C. H. and John Aloysius.

Mr. Hoffmann was always an out and out Democrat, and a very public spirited citizen, ever to the front to forward the interests of Hancock county. He served in various capacities of public trust and honor, and his death has closed the book of a long and useful career.

The family, doubly bereaved by the very recent death of their son and brother, Aloysius, have the ten der and heartfelt sympathy of the entire community. Their sorrow is crushing and the burden is heavy. Although our hearts bleed and our tears are blinding, we can only say, "Thy will be done, oh. Lord, and not ours." The Echo sympathizes deeply with the family in its loss.

The funeral took place Tuesday af ternoon from the late residence, with religious ceremony at the Church of Our Lady of the Gulf, Rev. Father Gmelch officiating. The deceased had been a devout member of the Catholic faith since his childhood and many were his benefactions to the church where he had worshipped. He was one of the trustees of the church, and helped both with his services and financial means to build the beautiful church with its cathedral-like proportions.

The funeral was largely attended, attesting to the popularity and high esteem in which the deceased was held in city and county. Many acquaintances from away were present at the last sad rites. Interment was in the Cavalry group receiving vaults, pending the erection of a new family tomb at St. Mary's cemetery.
